The transport sector is boiling over the fuel crisis

Transporters are angry over allegations of diesel and petrol supply cuts, and are threatening a nationwide agitation - Dr. Rajkumar Yadav

New Delhi - Questions raised about the supply of diesel and petrol across the country are now becoming a serious political and economic debate. Transport organizations, truck owners, and transporters allege that the central government is indirectly creating an artificial crisis by pressuring petrol pumps to control fuel supplies. They say that by controlling the supply of diesel and petrol by any means necessary, fear and instability are being created in the market.

Those in the transport sector allege that a significant increase in fuel prices is expected in the future. They say that if the public is already troubled by fuel shortages and long

queues, then opposition to a potential price increase of 20, 30, or 50 rupees will be weakened. This is being seen as a "planned economic pressure policy."

Transport organizations say that despite low international crude oil prices, petrol and diesel were sold at high prices in the country for a long time. During this period, oil companies and the government earned substantial revenues. Therefore, if oil companies are currently facing some financial pressure, it is unfair to shift the burden onto the general public, truck drivers, and transport professionals.

Responding nationally on this issue, Dr. Rajkumar Yadav, National



President, ₹Uftatsar National United Front (Truck Transporter Sarathi) UPSA, called on citizens, transport professionals, truck owners, transporters, and Sarathi brothers to unite. He stated that diesel is not just a means of driving, but the lifeline of the country's economy. If such pressures continue to be placed on fuel supply and

prices, it will directly impact food, agriculture, construction, and the daily lives of the common man.

Dr. Rajkumar Yadav stated that the country's transport sector is already grappling with the pressures of rising toll taxes, insurance premiums, expensive spare parts, and the economic recession. In such a situation, the diesel crisis has broken the back of truck drivers and transporters. He warned that if the government does not soon demonstrate clear policy and transparency, transport organizations across the country will be forced to launch a widespread movement.

He stated that this is not just an issue for transporters, but for every

business whose kitchen, agriculture, and daily needs depend on the transportation system. He appealed to all transport unions, truck owner associations, and charioteer organizations to organize and raise their voices democratically.

While there has been no official response from the government or oil companies to these allegations, the growing concern across the country makes it clear that fuel has now become a major issue not only for economic reasons but also for public life and social stability. In the coming days, the entire nation will be closely watching the government's policy and oil supply system.

Delhi Announces 'Metro Day', Work-From-Home Advisory and Online Classes to Ease Urban Pressure

The Government of Delhi has announced a series of austerity and public convenience measures, including a work-from-home advisory, online classes and a special 'Metro Day' initiative, aimed at reducing traffic congestion, fuel consumption and pressure on city infrastructure.

Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta said that every Monday would now be observed as "Metro Day", encouraging ministers and senior officials to use the metro for commuting whenever possible.

'Metro Day' to Promote Public Transport

Speaking about the initiative, Ms. Gupta stated that ministers and officers would use

the Delhi Metro to set an example for citizens and encourage greater use of public transportation.

Work-From-Home Advisory Issued

The government has also advised offices and institutions to adopt work-from-home arrangements wherever feasible to reduce traffic load and pollution levels.

Online Classes to Reduce Congestion

Educational institutions have been encouraged to shift to online classes temporarily in order to ease transportation pressure and improve urban mobility.

Focus on Sustainable Urban Management

The measures reflect Delhi's growing focus on sustainable urban governance,



energy conservation and efficient transport management.

Public Participation Seen as Key

Officials believe that citizen cooperation and behavioural change will play an important role in making these initiatives

effective.

In a way, Delhi's latest measures indicate a shift toward more sustainable and flexible urban living, where public transport and digital systems are becoming central to city management.

Today's Cybersecurity Thought: Sri Lanka: The New Hotspot for International Cybercrime Syndicates

Sri Lanka is emerging as a new hotspot for international cybercrime syndicates, with its territory increasingly exploited for large scale financial fraud through illegal call centre operations. Much like Cambodia, Sri Lanka risks becoming a rising hub for transnational cybercrime.

A recent crackdown revealed the scale of the

problem: 198 foreigners were arrested, including 173 Indians and 25 Nepalese, for involvement in organized cyber fraud networks. These individuals were charged with visa abuse, illegal employment, possession of contraband, and participation in sophisticated scams targeting victims abroad.

Key Facts from the Crackdown

- Total Arrests: 198 foreigners (173 Indians, 25 Nepalese)
- Hotspots: Galle, Hikkaduwa, Midigama (southern resort belt)
- Age Profile: Predominantly 25-35 years
- Charges:
 - o Misuse of tourist visas (overstay, illegal employment)
 - o Possession of duty free contraband (cigarettes)
 - o Cybercrime activities (fraud, scams, online exploitation)
- Trend: Since Jan 2026, 628 foreigners

arrested in Sri Lanka for cybercrime

Modus Operandi:

- Entry into Sri Lanka: Arrival on short-term tourist permits.
- Fraud centers: Setting up temporary scam centers using laptops and mobile phones.
- Target: Victims abroad, approached through online communication platforms.
- Evidence seized: During raids in Galle, police recovered 58

computers and 79 mobile phones.

Nature of Cybercrime Operations

Authorities report these groups were embedded in international syndicates leveraging Sri Lanka's connectivity and visa access. Their activities included:

1. Online Financial Frauds - fake investment platforms, loan scams, trading frauds
2. Digital Communication Scams - impersonation of officials,

"digital arrest" scams, extortion via video calls

3. Cross Border Syndicate Operations - coordinated teams using VoIP, encrypted apps, and social media to target victims in India and beyond

4. Illegal Call Centres - disguised as tourist businesses, often linked to Chinese and Southeast Asian networks

The arrests highlight how Indian nationals are being drawn into global cybercrime syndicates operating from Sri Lanka. Their activities—fraud, extortion, and illegal call centre operations—pose a serious threat to India's cyber security. A dual strategy of tighter visa monitoring and international law enforcement collaboration is critical to counter this growing menace.



The Immortal Tale of Baba Barfani: Why is the Mystery of Amarnath Even More Special Than the 12 Jyotirlingas?

In Hinduism, Lord Shiva is revered as the 'Infinite One'—He who has neither a beginning nor an end. Among His various manifestations, the form of 'Baba Barfani' (the Ice Lord), situated in Amarnath, is considered the most transcendental and awe-inspiring. Located at an altitude of over 14,500 feet above sea level, this cave serves not only as a focal point of faith but is also regarded as a gateway to attaining 'Moksha' (salvation).

A question often arises: despite not being included in the list of the 12 Jyotirlingas established across various parts of the country, why is the Amarnath Yatra (pilgrimage) considered one of the most arduous and significant spiritual journeys? The answer lies hidden within the natural mysteries and mythological legends associated with the site.

The Unique Significance of the Amareshwar Shivling: A Natural Miracle

The Shivling enshrined within the Amarnath Cave is also known as 'Amareshwar.' Its most remarkable feature is that it is a 'Swayambhu' (self-manifested) 'Himling' (Ice-Lingam). While other Jyotirlingas were established through ritualistic installation, the formation of Baba Barfani is entirely a natural phenomenon.

Natural Formation: Drops of water drip from the ceiling of the cave; these gradually freeze and solidify, eventually taking the shape of a colossal Shivling.

Connection to the Moon: This is the only Shivling in the world that changes its size in accordance with the phases of the moon. As the moon waxes (grows), the size of the Shivling also increases, reaching its full magnitude on the day of 'Purnima' (Full Moon). Subsequently, its size begins to gradually diminish until 'Amavasya' (New Moon).

Time of Manifestation: This sacred Shivling manifests specifically during the holy month of 'Sawan' (Shravan), and devotees can seek its 'Darshan' (sacred sight) until 'Raksha Bandhan' (the Full Moon of



Sawan).

Divine Companions: Within this sacred cave, it is not merely Lord Shiva (Mahadev) who manifests; ice formations representing Goddess Parvati and Lord Ganesha also form naturally alongside Him.

The Mythological History of the Amarnath Cave: The Mystery of the 'Amar Katha'

There is a fascinating legend behind how this sacred site acquired the name 'Amarnath.' According to religious beliefs, this is the very secluded spot that Lord Shiva chose to narrate the secret of immortality—the 'Amar Katha' (Tale of Immortality)—to Goddess Parvati.

Mahadev desired that while he narrated this tale, no third living being should be able to overhear it. Therefore, during his journey, he made several renunciations:

He left behind his divine bull, Nandi, at Pahalgam.

He removed the serpents coiled around his neck at Sheshnag Lake.

He renounced the five fundamental elements ('Panch Tattvas') at Panchtarni.

Finally, upon reaching this sacred cave, he narrated to Goddess Parvati the tale through which one can attain victory over death. For this very reason, this site is considered supremely holy for the attainment of 'Moksha' (salvation).

****The Mystery of the Immortal Pigeons: Living Symbols of Shiva and**

Parvati**

The greatest mystery associated with the Amarnath Cave is the pair of white pigeons often sighted there. According to mythological legends, while Lord Shiva was narrating the 'Amar Katha' to Goddess Parvati, she drifted off to sleep midway through the story; however, a pair of pigeons present at the site heard the entire narrative.

Having heard the tale, those pigeons attained immortality. When Mahadev discovered this, he was initially enraged; however, he subsequently bestowed a boon upon the pigeons, decreeing that they would forever reside within this cave as living symbols of Shiva and Parvati. To this day, in a region characterized by such extreme cold and a severe scarcity of oxygen—conditions under which the survival of birds is otherwise deemed impossible—devotees frequently catch a glimpse of these two pigeons. It is believed that anyone who is blessed with a sighting of them is truly fortunate.

****The Amarnath Yatra: A Test of Unwavering Faith and Courage****

The pilgrimage to Amarnath is not merely a religious excursion; it stands as a profound symbol of courage and faith. An altitude of 14,500 feet, a scarcity of oxygen, bone-chilling cold, and treacherous mountain trails combine to make this journey one of the most arduous pilgrimages in the world.

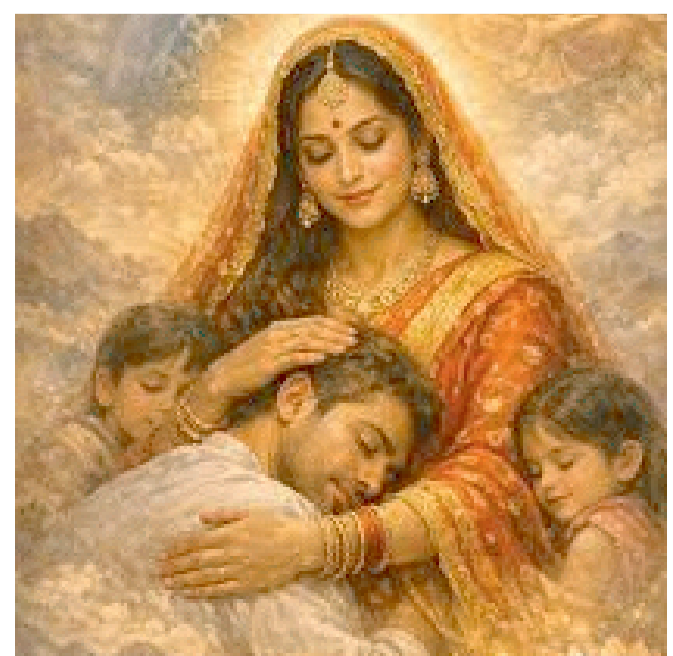
moment. For if the aspect of a woman that serves as an invitation to desire is withdrawn, the man immediately realizes that he has become calm and at peace.

Demand Intensifies for Restoration of ATR-72 Flight Services to Rourkela, Odisha



According to sources, as part of the airport expansion plan, the process of transferring the full ownership of Rourkela Airport from SAIL to the Airports Authority of India (AAI) is currently underway.

Rourkela: Amidst indications that the expansion of Rourkela Airport is likely to take several more years, the

demand for restoring ATR-72 flight services on the Rourkela-Bhubaneswar and Rourkela-Kolkata routes has intensified in an effort to meet the growing needs of air travelers.

Currently, only a nine-seater aircraft operates on this route, which is proving to be inadequate for the rising number of passengers.

Rai informed them that he is already aware of this issue

and is making every possible effort to introduce a 72-seater aircraft service as an interim arrangement.

Dr. Rajkumar Yadav, President of the Rourkela Goods Transporters Association, stated that the association has urged Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi and Union Civil Aviation Minister Kinjarapu Ram Mohan Naidu to immediately restore the ATR-72 service to

alleviate the difficulties currently being faced by passengers.

A senior official from the Rourkela Steel Plant, speaking on the condition of anonymity, revealed that work has already commenced on a project involving an investment of over ₹30,000 crore to more than double the plant's production capacity. Consequently, the need for improved air connectivity has

become even more critical. He added that the current nine-seater flight service is woefully inadequate.

The incident involving the emergency landing of a Cessna 208 Caravan aircraft near Rourkela on January 10 has also shaken passenger confidence. As a result, many travelers are now hesitant to fly in small aircraft. Notably, Alliance Air had launched ATR-72 services on the

Rourkela-Bhubaneswar and Rourkela-Kolkata routes in mid-July 2025 under the RCS-UDAN scheme.

However, despite strong seat bookings, the airline suspended the service, citing the limited availability of ATR-72 aircraft. Subsequently, since December 5, 2025, IndiaOne Air has been temporarily operating nine-seater aircraft on the Rourkela-

Bhubaneswar route.

According to sources, the process of transferring the full ownership of Rourkela Airport from SAIL to the Airports Authority of India (AAI) is currently underway as part of the airport expansion plan. The Government of Odisha plans to develop this airport into a Code-4C category facility, which will enable the operation of larger aircraft.

Trump in the Dragon Land-Tehran in the Heart: Chaos over Taiwan-Superpowers' Grand Council - Mission Tehran, Taiwan Sacrifice-A comprehensive analysis of the deep tensions

Globally, US President Donald Trump's visit to China from May 13 to 15, 2026, was not just a formal state visit, but a platform for changing global politics, a faltering economy, wars in West Asia, the Taiwan crisis, and the new strategic chessboard of superpowers, with the entire world's attention focused on it. This major official visit by a US President to China, the first in nearly nine years, comes at a time when the global system is experiencing instability on multiple fronts. On one hand, the Iran-US tensions in West Asia and the crisis in the Strait of Hormuz are raising the pulse of the global economy, while on the other hand, the US and China are facing off over Taiwan in the Indo-Pacific region. The meeting between Trump and Chinese President Xi Jinping in Beijing clearly indicated that the world is moving toward a new world order governed not solely by military power, but by economic alliances, technological competition, and strategic pressure. I, Advocate Kishan Sanmukhdas Bhawani, Gondia, Maharashtra, consider this summit a grand meeting of superpowers, where there were smiles on the outside, but deep tensions existed within regarding Tehran and Taiwan.

Friends, Trump's visit comes at a time when relations between the United States and China have been increasingly strained for several years over

issues like trade wars, technology sanctions, chip industry competition, the South China Sea dispute, and the Taiwan question. While both countries publicly employed the language of dialogue and stability, the reality is that the two superpowers arrived at the negotiating table with their own strategic priorities. For the United States, the primary goal was to control the escalating conflict in West Asia, reopen the Strait of Hormuz, and stabilize global supply chains. For China, Taiwan remains a matter of sovereignty and national pride. Therefore, when Xi Jinping told Trump at the Beijing meeting that Taiwan was the most sensitive issue in China-US relations, it was not merely a diplomatic statement but a direct strategic warning. This visit is also considered historic because it was Trump's first visit to China after his second term as president. He had previously visited China in 2017. The global landscape was different then, but now the world is moving towards a multipolar balance of power. Trump and Xi Jinping met in Busan, South Korea, in 2025, but this meeting in Beijing is considered even more decisive. This time, the US President did not arrive alone. He was accompanied by some of the world's most influential technology and corporate figures, including Elon Musk, Tim Cook, and Jensen-Hooghe. This signaled that this visit is not limited to geopolitics; it also focuses on the global economy, technological dominance, and market restructuring.

Friends, the current competition between the US and China is not just about military power, but rather about control of artificial intelligence, semiconductors, electric vehicles, data, 5G networks, and global supply chains. The US wants to reduce its technological dependence on China, while China is rapidly moving towards technological self-reliance despite Western sanctions. The arrival of the heads of top US tech companies with Trump in Beijing demonstrates that, despite the economic rivalry between the two countries, commercial interests remain the most important bridge for communication. China is the world's largest consumer

market, and American companies want to maintain their presence there. China, meanwhile, does not want to completely lose American investment, technology, and market access. But the Iran crisis emerged as the central issue of this entire visit. The escalating conflict between the United States and Iran in West Asia has threatened global energy security. The Strait of Hormuz, through which a large portion of the world's oil trade passes, is under severe strain due to the war. The energy supply of many Asian countries, including India, depends on this route. India imports more than 85 percent of its oil needs, a significant portion of which comes through the Strait of Hormuz. The war and maritime tensions have led to a sharp rise in oil prices, which is impacting the Indian economy, the rupee, and inflation. Consequently, the entire world was watching to see if Trump would try to pressure Iran through China.

Friends, China is one of Iran's largest economic partners. China is a major buyer of Iranian oil and its strategic presence in West Asia has steadily increased. This is why the US now appears to be seeking China's assistance in bringing Tehran back to the negotiating table. Many analysts believe that the real purpose of Trump's visit to Beijing was ₹Mission Tehran. The US understands that it will be difficult to persuade Iran through military pressure alone. If China wishes, it can induce Iran to negotiate through economic and diplomatic influence. Therefore, this visit is giving rise to debates like ₹Mission Tehran and ₹Sacrifice Taiwan, where the question is being raised about whether the US might adopt a relatively softer stance on Taiwan in exchange for a resolution to the Iran crisis. However, China also made full strategic use of this opportunity. President Xi Jinping did not personally go to the airport to receive Trump. Such signals are viewed very seriously in international diplomacy. This sent the message that China wants dialogue with the US, but on equal terms. China made it clear that its red line on Taiwan remains intact. Xi Jinping clearly stated that Taiwan is

China's internal matter and that if the issue is handled incorrectly, it could lead to a direct conflict between the two countries. This statement was not only directed at the US, but also at Taiwan and its allies.

Friends, Taiwan also reacted sharply to this. Taiwanese governments spokespersons stated that China's military aggression is the biggest source of insecurity in the Indo-Pacific region. Taiwan is continuously working to enhance its defense capabilities and strengthen strategic partnerships with allies, including the US. In recent years, China has intensified military activities around Taiwan, raising tensions throughout the region. The US has been providing arms assistance to Taiwan, while China considers this an interference in its sovereignty. This is why Taiwan became the most sensitive issue in the Beijing talks.

Friends, interestingly, Trump tried to avoid a direct answer regarding Taiwan. When reporters asked him whether Taiwan was discussed with Xi Jinping, he changed the subject and began talking about the beauty of China. Many experts consider this a strategic silence. It's possible that Trump is prioritizing Iran and the global trade crisis at this time and doesn't want to anger China by making overt statements on Taiwan. This is why discussions have intensified worldwide about whether the US is moving toward a major strategic agreement. The economic aspect of this visit is equally important. The US wants China to increase its purchases of American agricultural products, energy resources, and Boeing aircraft. China, on the other hand, wants a relaxation of US technological sanctions. For the first time since the trade war, both countries have openly discussed economic stability. If a trade agreement between the US and China moves forward, it could have a positive impact on global markets. Lower oil prices, restored supply chains, and improved investor confidence could provide relief to the global economy.

Friends, this visit is also extremely important for India. On the one hand, India is a strategic partner of the US, while on the other, China is its biggest regional rival. If

tensions between the US and China ease, new equations could emerge in the strategic politics of the Indo-Pacific. On the other hand, if the Hormuz crisis is resolved and oil prices fall, India will receive economic relief. Stabilizing petrol and diesel prices, strengthening the rupee, and reducing the import bill will all be positive signs for the Indian economy.

Friends, this meeting in Beijing also discussed issues such as artificial intelligence, the Ukrainian war, and global economic instability. This demonstrates that the US and China are no longer merely bilateral competitors, but two superpowers whose decisions shape the course of the entire world. A deterioration in relations between the two could lead to a global recession, technological divide, and increased military tensions. However, if both choose a path of limited cooperation, the prospects for global stability could increase.

So, if we study and analyze the above account, we will find that this entire visit once again makes it clear that national interests are more important than idealism in modern world politics. Every country makes decisions based on its economic, strategic, and political interests. The US wants to control the Iran crisis and the global economy. China does not want to weaken its hold on Taiwan. Both countries are both rivals and, when necessary, partners. This is the reality of today's global politics. This meeting between Trump and Xi Jinping in Beijing has become not just a meeting between two leaders, but an event that will determine the global direction of the coming decade. On one side is Trump's ₹deal-making politics, on the other is Xi Jinping's dream of national renaissance. On one side is the crisis in Tehran, on the other is the explosive question of Taiwan. Between these two stands the entire world, wondering whether the superpowers will be able to control the competition or whether the future will lead to a new Cold War and major conflicts. It is clear that this superpower summit in the Land of the Dragon is not just a current headline, but the opening chapter of a future geopolitical script.

People have to stand in long queues for about one and a half to two hours. After waiting for hours, people are getting oil.

If the oil supply does not return to normal soon, then the city's transport system is expected to come

to a complete standstill in the coming days. Meanwhile, all these things are rumoured by the editor of the Domestic Petrol Dealers Association. Big information from the editor of the Domestic Petrol Dealers Association, Sanjay Latha.

Election Commission's big announcement: 'Third phase' of special intensive revision of voter list to begin Odisha

Bhubaneswar: The Election Commission of India has issued orders to start the third phase of the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) program of the voter list in 16 states and 3 union territories of the country, including Odisha. The commission informed that the schedule has been fixed keeping in mind the ongoing house-to-house enumeration process for the census.

According to the Election Commission, the revision program will be carried out in phases across the country, barring Himachal Pradesh, Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh. The schedule will be announced separately after the

completion of the second phase of the census and adverse weather conditions in these three regions.

In this extensive special intensive revision process to be held in the state, about 38,123 Booth Level Officers (BLOs) will go door to door to verify the details of voters. To support them, 27,723

Booth Level Agents (BLAs) have been deployed by various political parties in the state.

The Election Commission has requested all political parties to appoint one Booth Level Agent in each booth to ensure a fair and impartial verification process. It is worth noting that

in the previous two phases, the data of about 59 crore voters in 13 states and union territories were successfully verified. More than 6.3 lakh Booth Level Officers (BLOs) and 9.2 lakh Booth Level Agents (BLAs) have been deployed by various political parties in various phases of this process.

He asserted that the government faces no shortage of funds for the development of Bhagwan Valmiki Ji Tirath Sthal.
